Our Mission

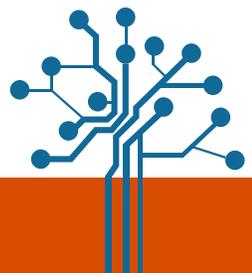
Uniting organizations and volunteers to transform lives through digital literacy training.

Our Vision

A world where all people appreciate the value of the internet and have the digital skills and access needed to improve the quality of their lives.



Digital devices like smartphones, tablets, and laptops have permeated every corner of our lives from work to school to personal relationships. Public services and essential information are increasingly moving online, and many people are unable to access and leverage these resources. These days, digital illiteracy is nearly as debilitating as traditional illiteracy. While many organizations are working to spread internet connectivity to the underserved, access to technology is only a partial solution. Connectivity must be coupled with digital skills training that is relevant and delivered in a way that won't intimidate the adult learner. This training must be part of a well-rounded education that includes using these devices to enrich lives and achieve a variety of goals.

2019 marked Community Tech Network's 11th year. We are proud to continue developing and delivering digital literacy training to low-income adults and seniors in the San Francisco Bay Area and in Central Texas.

We're proud of the impact that we are having with our partners and programs. While you'll find more stories throughout our annual report, these are some of the highlights of which we are most proud:

- The San Francisco Department of Disability and Aging Services, CTN, and several other nonprofits partner on the SF Connected program. CTN organizes a network of trainers who provided 5,284 training hours to over 500 low-income seniors across San Francisco.
- In partnership with Twitter and the NeighborNest, we offered a total of seven classes in English and in Spanish to nearly 90 learners. The classes were focused on Beyond the Basics and Computers for Work.
- We provided digital literacy training and distributed 217 devices at eight low-income housing developments and six schools funded by the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC).
- Sunset Tech Connect, funded by Metta Fund, provided 12-weeks of training and tablets to 48 monolingual Chinese seniors in the Sunset neighborhood of San Francisco.
- We wrapped up a program in partnership with Family Eldercare in Austin, funded by the Consumer Technology Associate Foundation, that provided training and tablets to 40 seniors.
- Digital Parents, a class focused on helping parents gain basic digital skills in order to support their children's education and better communicate with their children's school, was offered in Sunnyvale, CA and Austin, TX. In total, we provided training and devices to 42 Spanish speaking and 10 English speaking adults.

The volunteers, staff, and board of CTN could not have done this without the support of our generous community. We look forward to continuing to work with underserved communities to ensure that everyone has access to the internet.

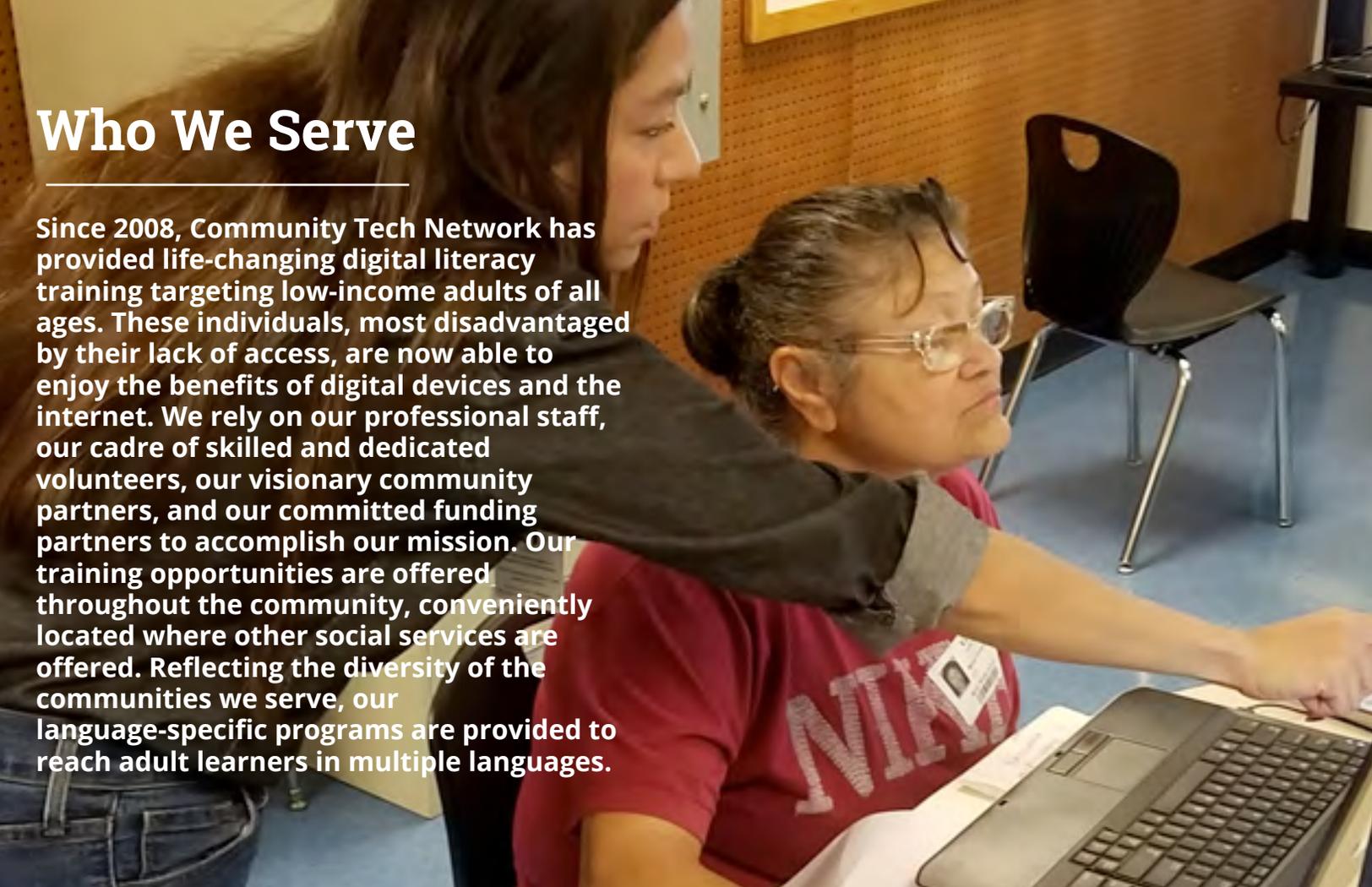

Who We Serve

Since 2008, Community Tech Network has provided life-changing digital literacy training targeting low-income adults of all ages. These individuals, most disadvantaged by their lack of access, are now able to enjoy the benefits of digital devices and the internet. We rely on our professional staff, our cadre of skilled and dedicated volunteers, our visionary community partners, and our committed funding partners to accomplish our mission. Our training opportunities are offered throughout the community, conveniently located where other social services are offered. Reflecting the diversity of the communities we serve, our language-specific programs are provided to reach adult learners in multiple languages.



Digital Skills Classes for Parents in Austin

CTN partnered with Latinitas, a nonprofit focused on empowering girls to innovate through technology, to provide a basic digital literacy class at Martin Middle School in Austin. The participants were parents and grandparents who were using smartphones but were unable to access an important online tool called BLEND, which is used by the school to share grades, attendance, and assignments. Upon completion of the 8-hour course, each participant received a refurbished laptop. Funding for the curriculum development and the computers was provided by individual donors, Google Fiber, and Collins Technology Fund.



Sunnyvale Parents Enjoy New Digital Literacy Program

It is essential that parents of school-age children are able to use a computer so they can support their children's passage through school. CTN partnered with the City of Sunnyvale, California, to provide Spanish-language digital literacy training to parents at one middle school and five elementary schools. Parents learned skills that allow them to better communicate with the school, including "digital parenting," which helps parents ensure that their children are protected online. Each parent was required to receive a minimum of 8 hours of training in order to graduate and be awarded with a device.

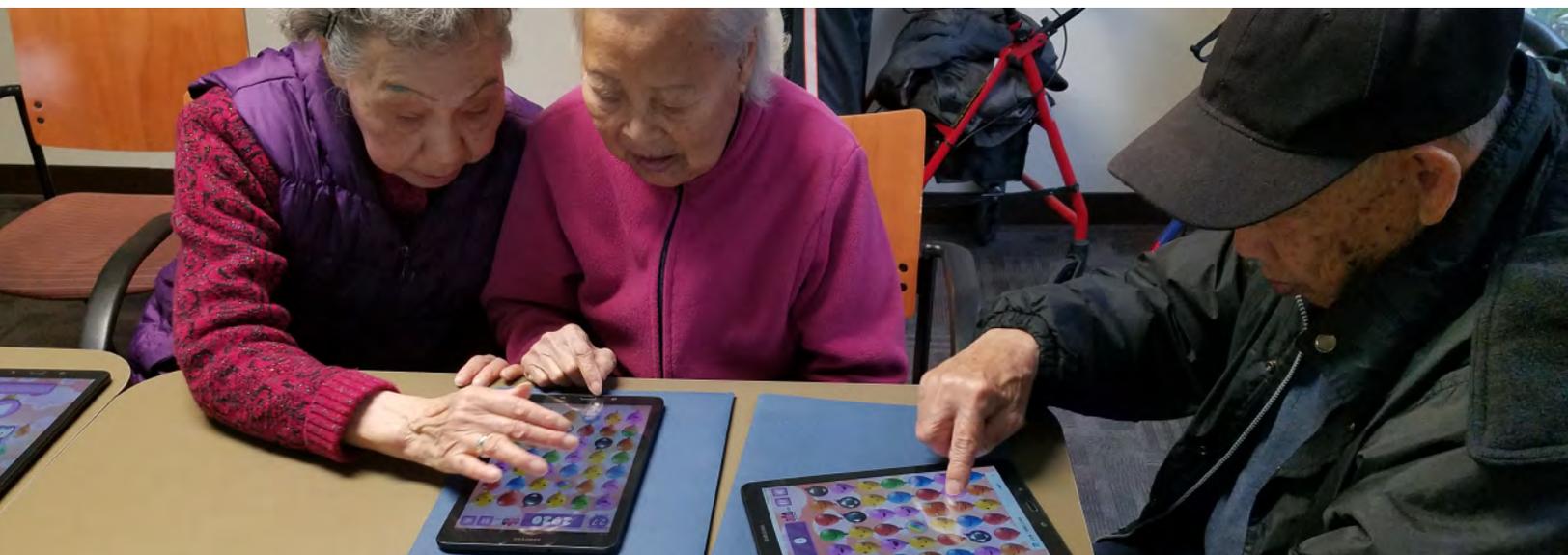
19 Spanish-speakers graduated from Beyond the Basics class at Twitter's NeighborNest

Shown here are 19 Spanish-language learners who graduated in October from the Beyond the Basics course that CTN held at the NeighborNest in San Francisco, Twitter's largest class this year! Thirteen of those graduates continued on to the highest-level class we currently offer: Spanish Computer Skills for Work. In this four-week series, they learn essential skills that are required in an office setting: spreadsheets using Google Sheets, email etiquette, Google Drive, and how to make conference calls.



Tablet Class Taught at SAHA Senior Housing

For many of us, technology provides convenience, entertainment, and a moment of distraction. For some, however, tablets can become an essential connection to the outside world. The power of technology to connect people is a centerpiece of CTN's program with Satellite Affordable Housing Association (SAHA), now in its third year. Funded by the California Public Utilities Commission, the language-specific classes were taught entirely in Cantonese, Mandarin, English, Vietnamese, Korean, Russian, and Farsi.

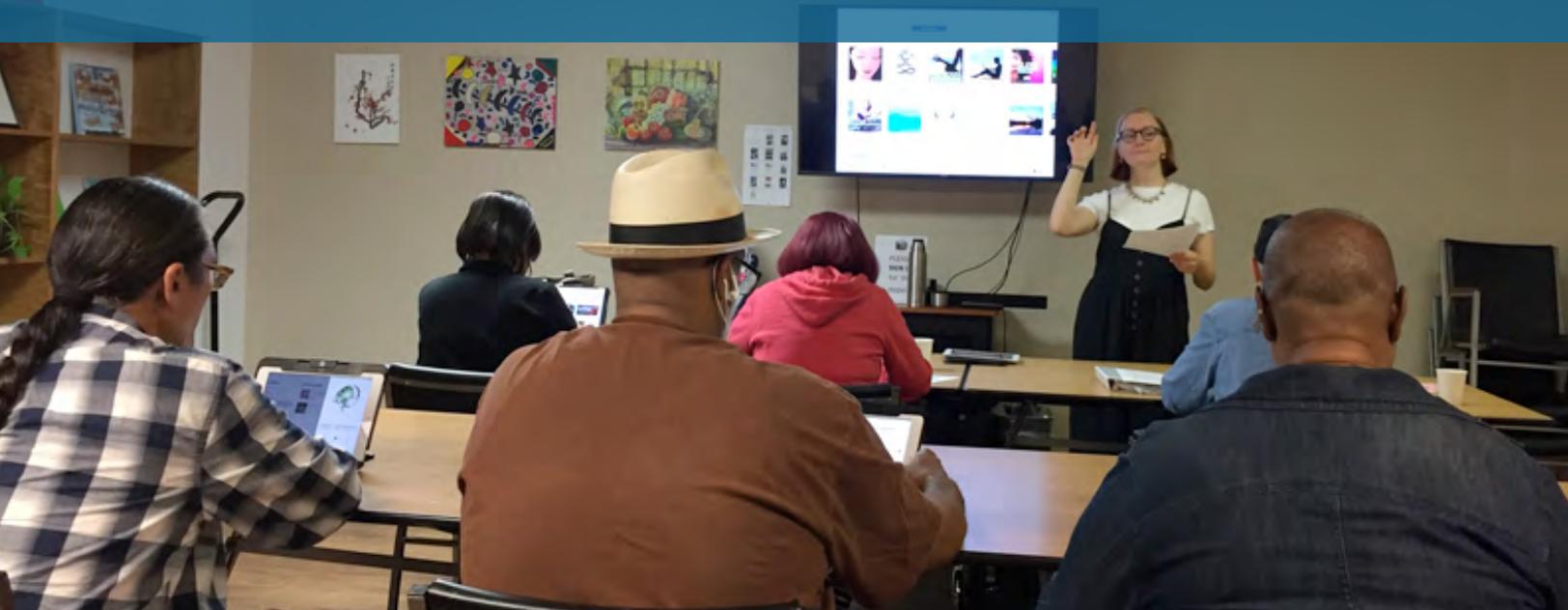

Senior Vitality Program at Curry Senior Center

Curry Senior Center is a valued training partner of CTN. Their Senior Vitality program helps clients sign up for home internet service, provides training on how to use an iPad, and layers in a health-related component utilizing a wearable (like a Fitbit) and a digital scale. The 12-month program provided at no cost accommodates 60 seniors annually and consists of 25 separate lessons. Curry Senior Center developed the curriculum, and CTN provides training in English, Cantonese, and Russian.

Digital Inclusion Week Celebration, Austin

Digital Inclusion Week (DIW) is an annual opportunity to raise awareness about solutions that address home internet access, access to digital devices, and local technology training programs. CTN Austin hosted two Tech Teach-In (TTI) events focused on providing digital skills training to older adults. The first, provided in partnership with Google Fiber employees, was training for residents at Wildflower Terrace, a Family Eldercare senior housing community. At the second event, Adobe employees volunteered at the AGE Computer Lab.

CTN wrapped up its DIW activities by throwing a party! The Digital Empowerment Community of Austin (DECA) and CTN facilitated an event at Google Fiber for nearly 100 people. The great lineup of speakers showcased some of the great digital equity work happening throughout the city.

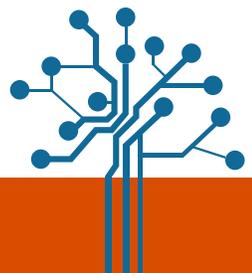

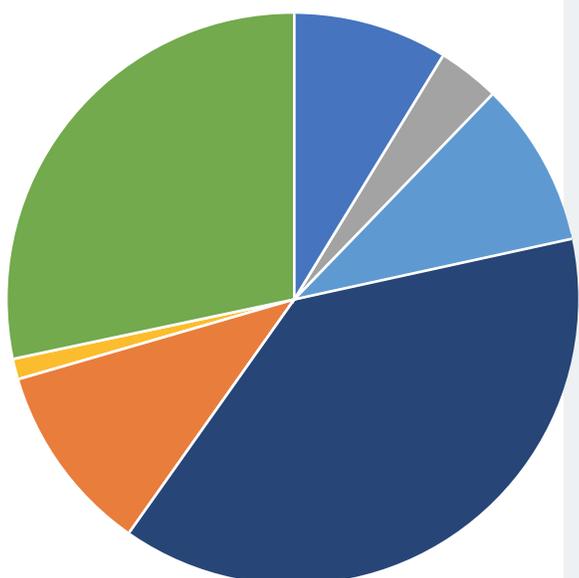
